LAND OF THE THUNDER DRAGON

Discover Breathtaking Bhutan.



The Kingdom of Bhutan is a tranquil country where you can explore ancient cultures, stunning landscapes, and magnificent architecture. Known as Druk Yul by the locals, it is aptly dubbed the 'Land of the Thunder Dragon.' This beautiful and precious land is situated at the eastern edge of the Himalayan range.

Much of the country is forested, boasting a diverse ecosystem of flora and fauna. Bhutan's terrain is perfect for trekking adventures, allowing visitors to explore ancient architecture and Buddhist temples scattered across the landscape.

With a population of around 700,000, most of Bhutan's residents practice Buddhism. The secluded nature of the land has preserved its rich history, which is celebrated through vibrant festival reenactments. Bhutan's ancient cultural traditions have remained remarkably intact over the centuries.



HIGH VALUE - LOW VOLUME TOURISM

In order to prevent the detrimental effects of mass tourism. Bhutan adheres to a strict 'High value, low volume' tourism policy since 1974. As part of the policy, the government implements a Sustainable Development Fee (SDF) for all international tourists to sustain its cultural traditions, protect its environment and upgrade infrastructure.

NATIONAL ANIMAL

Bhutan's national animal is the Takin, or gnu goat – a rare mammal that is often associated with religious history and mythology.



NATIONAL FLOWER

The national flower of Bhutan is the Himalayan Blue Poppy. These exotic and rare flowers grow at an elevation of 3,700 - 4.300 metres above sea level.

GROSS NATIONAL HAPPINESS

Bhutan is famous for being the first country to measure progress based on happiness. The 4th Druk Gyalpo, King of Bhutan, coined the term Gross National Happiness (GNH), and it now measures development rather than Gross National Product (GDP).

BHUTANESE ARCHITECTURE

Bhutan has stunning architectural buildings made from traditional method using stones, pounded mud, timber and shingled roofs. Most of the buildings are constructed without any nails!




Dzongs were built in the 17th century as ancient fortresses to defend the country from invasions. Presently, dzongs are used as government administrative offices and district monastic body for the 20 districts.



Lhakhangs in Bhutan are sacred Buddhist temples or monasteries, characterised by their distinct architecture and intricate murals, such as the Wheel of Life.



Goembas are larger monasteries or hermitages with an autonomous community, for religious practice, meditation and Buddhist study. Goembas, like all religious buildings, have a khemar, or red stripe. beneath the roof.




In Bhutanese architecture, intricate woodwork plays a central role, with skilled artisans crafting detailed carvings and decorations that adorn the exteriors and interiors of buildings. These carvings often feature traditional motifs such as auspicious symbols, mythical creatures, and religious iconography, showcasing the country's deep-rooted cultural heritage and spiritual beliefs. They are often adorned with vibrant paintings and murals, depicting scenes from Buddhist mythology, historical events, and everyday life. These not only enhance the beauty of the structures but also serve to convey religious teachings and cultural narratives.



CULTURE & FESTIVALS

Bhutan's cultural festivals offer colorful displays of tradition.

For generations, Bhutan has isolated its culture and society from outside influences. This drive is to ensure the protection of ancient teachings. Today, these teachings are passed on through festivals and other events that tell stories of their ancestry. Bhutanese participate in elaborate festivals to create detailed recreations and dances that entertain and bestow onto others the Bhutanese spiritual life story.



Among these festivals, a unique and special feature is the **Thongdrel**, a large religious applique. Thongdrels are carefully made with great detail, making them holy artifacts with deep spiritual and artistic value. The Thongdrel is usually displayed early in the morning and rolled up before the sun touches it, representing the Buddhist idea of life's impermanence. This tradition highlights the holy nature of the Thongdrel and the deep respect it commands.







BHUTANESE FESTIVALS

Tshechu literally means 'tenth day' and is considered the most important religious festival in Bhutan. It is held annually in the monasteries and dzongs of all the 20 districts. In the different months of the year, the festival honours Guru Rinpoche, who brought Buddhism to Bhutan in the 8th century. A tshechu typically lasts for four or five days. It is celebrated on the tenth day of the Bhutanese lunar calendar, corresponding to the birthday of Guru Rinpoche. Hence, the exact dates of the tshechu in the different

districts vary from year to year.

For Bhutanese, attending this religious festival is an integral part of their spiritual devotion to Buddhism. They believe that by attending the festival, they can accumulate spiritual merits and move towards enlightenment.





STATE RELIGION

Bhutan is the only country in the world where Vajrayana Buddhism, known as the 'Thunderbolt Vehicle' or 'Diamond Vehicle', is practiced as the state religion. Ever since Buddhism was introduced to the country, religion has been very prevalent in every facet of Bhutanese life. Buddhist values are often inculcated in the younger generations during their formative years.



MOST POPULAR FESTIVALS

The most popular tshechus for tourists to attend are **Paro Tshechu** during spring (March to May) and Thimphu Tshechu and Bumthang Tshechu during autumn (September to November).


The highlight of the festival is the sacred **Cham** performances by both laity and monks dressed in ornate costumes. The ancient dances have been transmitted in Bhutan from person-to-person, for hundreds of years. Young monks undergo an extensive apprenticeship to learn the precise steps and positions for the performance.

Ritual music is played using cymbal, drum, flute, and yak-horn to accompany the dances. Dancers usually wear wooden masks that represent animals and fearsome deities.



ATSARAS

The Atsara — a comical character in a red mask and a big phallus on top of his that the festival runs smoothly and, more importantly, helps the audience put their worries behind.






PRAYER WHEELS

You can find prayer wheels across Bhutan! They are commonly crafted from materials such as wood, stone, brass, tin, or coarse cotton. There are many types of prayer wheels and the prayer wheels can be activated manually, by water, or through fire.

Spinning the prayer wheels can bring enlightenment to all sentient beings. When spun clockwise, the wheel releases prayers into the world, purifying negative energies and bestowing blessings and wishes.





FUN FACT

In Bhutan, archery, the national sport, is more than just a sport. It is a way of life. Traditional Bhutanese archery has a range that is 145 metres long, double the length of an Olympic range. Archery tournaments are social events filled with songs, dances, and taunts.



TREKKING

Bhutan is home to some of the most magnificent Himalayan trails. Whether you are an experienced hiker or a novice, you will find trails in Bhutan that suit your fitness level. Bhutan offers treks of various durations. There are short treks ranging from a few days to month-long expeditions.



CYCLING

Many of the biking trails are on paved roads, but there are quite a few off-road trails. Some of the terrain may be more challenging as you enter the mountainous region. Biking in Bhutan can take you through towns and small villages where you can experience the Bhutanese culture.



WHITEWATER RAFTING AND KAYAKING

White water rafting and kayaking in Bhutan offer an exhilarating way to explore the kingdom's pristine rivers, which flow from the high Himalayas. The Pho Chhu rivers provide a range of rapids suitable for both beginners experienced and adventurers.

MORE ACTIVITIES




PARO

Paro is the gateway to the kingdom where the international airport is located. Bhutan's most iconic landmark, Taktsang Monastery and many sacred sites and historic buildings are also located within Paro.

PLACES TO **VISIT IN PARO**


1 TAKTSANG

A trip to Bhutan is incomplete without a visit to this iconic monastery, popularly known as Tiger's Nest. The temple is perched atop the cliffside about 900 m above Paro valley.

The hike up to the Tiger's Nest is an experience not to be missed in Bhutan! The trek up and down Taktsang Monastery can take anywhere between 3.5 hours to 9 hours, depending on your fitness level.




- Upon arrival at Tiger's Nest Monastery, you leave cameras, phones and other belongings in a locker for security.
- •You can rent walking sticks at the trailhead before you start your hike.
- Apply sunscreen
- Bring along a water bottle and snacks.
- Please respect the putting trash in the garbage bins.



2 PARO DZONG (RINPUNG DZONG)

Paro Dzong, also known as Rinpung Dzong, or the 'Fortress of the Heaps of Jewels', is a very distinguished building in the Paro district. You can catch a glimpse of it while your flight is landing at Paro International Airport. The dzong was built in 1644 under the instruction of Zhabdrung Ngawang Namgyal, the founder of Bhutan.



3 KYICHU LHAKHANG

The 7th century Kyichu Lhakhang, also known as Lho Kyerchu or Kyerchu, is the oldest and one of the most beautiful temples in Bhutan. Bhutanese revere the temple as a sacred jewel of Bhutan. The original temple was said to have been built overnight and used to be a smaller structure before the monastery was expanded.

BHUTAN FACT: BHUTAN CURRENCY

Ngultrum (NU) is Bhutan's currency. Until the 1960's, Bhutanese bartered goods and services because there was no paper money. Today, in addition to ngultrum, you can use Indian rupees at different shops and restaurants around the country.


4 CHELELA PASS

Chelela Pass offers visitors a stunning vista of the sacred Mount, Jomolhari in addition to Jichu Drake. Prayer flags flutter in the wind, and roses of many colors blanket the pass throughout spring.



5 DRUKGYEL **DZONG**

The ancient ruins of Drukgyel Dzong is a famous archaeological site in Bhutan, located on a ridge in the upper Paro valley. It was constructed in 1649 and served as an important defence base in the region until 1951, when fire almost destroyed it completely.



TIP: Drukgyel Dzong is a great picnic spot. On clear lucky days, you will see the highest peaks in Bhutan.

F&B RECOMMENDATIONS IN PARO

Paro Valley, often called the Gateway to Bhutan, may be quieter than Thimphu, but it's quickly carving out a name for itself in the culinary scene. Whether you're refuelling after a hike to Tiger's Nest or winding down after sightseeing, these are our top picks for places to eat in Paro.

POPULAR RESTAURANTS IN PARO

1 SONAM TROPEL RESTAURANT, PARO TOWN

A beloved family-run eatery serving hearty Bhutanese classics and crowd-pleasers like fried rice, chilli chicken, and momos since 1993.

2 MOUNTAIN CAFÉ & MOUNTAIN CAFÉ AND ROASTERY, PARO TOWN

Two outlets, one name. The vegetarian café offers hoentey and Oreo cheesecake, while the roastery serves BBQ pork ribs and homegrown Bhutanese coffee roasted on-site.

3 BRIOCHE CAFÉ, PARO TOWN

A charming patisserie known for organic, locally sourced bakes. Try the croissants, apple crumble, or seasonal ice cream with a cup of masala tea.

4 COFFEE POINT CAFÉ, SATSAM CHORTEN

A cozy café located next to the Silver Cloud Hotel, run by the same owners. It's the perfect stop after your hike up Tiger's Nest, serving locally grown coffee along side a selection of fresh pastries, pizzas, and burgers.

5 PHANGGUU PARO, OPPOSITE PARO DZONG

A warm, traditional setting with delicious homestyle Bhutanese food. Try the buckwheat pancakes (khuley), spicy aezey, and dried pork (sikam paa).

6 MY KIND OF PLACE, PARO TOWN

A colourful, plant-filled café offering a mix of Bhutanese and Pan-Asian dishes. Don't miss the bhaley with ema datsi or Vietnamese and Thai options.

7 MOMO CORNER, PARO TOWN

Quick, delicious, and budget-friendly. This local favourite is a top contender for the best momos in town — try the fried beef momo with soup.



POPULAR BARS IN PARO

1 PARK 76 CAFÉ AND PUB, PARO TOWN

Just off the main street, Park 76 is a lively favourite with locals and travellers alike. Expect live music, craft beers, and hearty plates like sizzlers and burgers.

2 CLUB INSOMNIA, BELOW PARK 76

Tucked in the basement of Park 76, this late-night spot keeps the party going with DJs spinning everything from English hits to Dzongkha and Hindi remixes.

3 NAMGAY ARTISANAL BREWERY, DUMSIBU



Bhutan's beloved microbrewery offers eight craft beers on tap and stunning valley views. Try the Red Rice Lager or go for a tasting flight to sample them all.

4 UMA BAR, COMO UMA PARO



Start your evening in style at this upscale bar with signature cocktails and a curated Bhutanese menu. Refined, cosy, and perfect for a classy night out.

5 ROADSIDE BAR AND KITCHEN, **CHUZOM-PARO HIGHWAY**

A hidden gem near the highway, this quirky bar serves local drinks, greenery-filled interiors, and fun snacks like koka chowmein in a laid-back setting.

6 OLD FACTORY RESTAURANT AND BAR, **JANGSA**

A Thimphu favourite now in Paro, known for signature cocktails, nachos, wings, and occasional live music. Follow them online to catch a performance night.

OPPA'S PUB, BELOW UGYEN TSHONGKHANG BUILDING

Swanky and playful, Oppa's is known for live music, themed nights, and fun drinks like the 'Pink Dream' mocktail. Don't miss the crispy pork belly.



THIMPHU

The capital and largest city of Bhutan. A modern city which still retains its' cultural identity and values.



Thimphu is the capital of Bhutan and the largest city in the country, located in the western region. It is also the political and economic hub of the country that houses most of the important government buildings and constitutional agencies.

Many of the locals from rural places migrate to Thimphu to seek employment. This vibrant city contains a rustic charm that has much to offer to travellers. It is the seat of government of Bhutan, with an ancient dzong and a more recent House of Parliament nearby. You can also find many cafes and handicraft shops around Thimphu town.

FUN FACT: Thimphu is one of the few capital cities in the world without traffic lights, relying instead on elegantly dressed traffic police to control the traffic.






PLACES TO VISIT IN THIMPHU


1 THIMPHU DZONG

Tashichho Dzong, commonly known as Thimphu Dzong, is an impressive structure situated in the northern part of Thimphu city that plays the dual role of housing the administration of the state and the clergy. It has been the seat of the government since 1952 and currently houses the throne room and offices of the Royal Government of Bhutan.




2 BUDDHA POINT

Buddha Dordenma, also known as Buddha Point, is a famous attraction in Bhutan. This sitting Buddha statue that measures 51.5 m in height is one of the largest sitting Buddha statues in the world. The statue is made of solid bronze and gilded with paint, as are all of the 125,000 smaller Buddha statues placed within the giant statue.



3 DOCHULA PASS

Located between Thimphu and Punakha at an elevation of 3,100 m, the view from Dochula Pass is breathtaking. You can even see the Himalayan mountains from the pass, including Gangkar Puensum, the highest unclimbed mountain on a clear day.





4 FOLK HERITAGE **MUSEUM**

The Folk Heritage Museum is set inside a three-storey 19th-century traditional house. The museum provides visitors with a glimpse of the traditional Bhutanese lifestyle and artefacts in a conventional household.



5 ROYAL TEXTILE **ACADEMY**

RTA is Bhutan's sole textile museum, a treasure trove of exhibitions that continuously unveil the fascinating world of Bhutanese weaving. Immerse yourself in the intricate and captivating realm of Bhutanese textiles, where every thread carries stories of tradition, craftsmanship, and symbolism.

BHUTAN FACT: LANGUAGES IN BHUTAN

The official language in Bhutan is Dzongkha. Bhutanese also speak Tshanglakha and the Lhotshamkha. There are at least 19 dialects of Dzongkha that are spoken all over Bhutan. Most young people in Bhutan can speak fluent English as it's the medium of instruction in schools.

6 SIMPLY BHUTAN

Simply Bhutan is an interactive museum that offers you an excellent guided introduction to different aspects of traditional Bhutanese life. This is an excellent place for your induction into Bhutan.

You will learn how to dress up in Bhutanese traditional dress, distil ara (rice wine), and understand how Bhutanese construct their homes out of rammed earth.




WHERE TO STAY IN THIMPHU



1 SIX SENSES

Six Senses is a luxury brand renowned for its focus on wellness and sustainability. POPULAR RESTAURANTS IN **THIMPHU**

1 FOLK HERITAGE RESTAURANT, **KAWAJANGSA**

Tucked near the Folk Heritage Museum, this spot serves seasonal Bhutanese dishes in a traditional farmhouse-style setting.

2 BABESA VILLAGE RESTAURANT, BABESA

Step back in time at this 600-year-old home-turnedrestaurant. Enjoy authentic Bhutanese flavours by the hearth.

PHANGU, TABA

Known for cosy, themed private rooms decorated with traditional Bhutanese art. Ideal for group dining with a local touch.

4 SEASONS PIZZERIA, HONGKONG MARKET

A go-to for wood-fired pizzas and fusion plates. Great for families or anyone craving a Western-style meal.

5 AMBIENT CAFÉ, NORZIN LAM

A relaxed, vegetarian-friendly café loved for its wholesome menu, great coffee, and community vibe.

6 T.C. RESTAURANT, CLOCK TOWER AREA

A reliable local favourite for casual meals — fast, tasty, and affordable with a variety of Bhutanese and Asian dishes.

DRUK HOTEL, NEAR CLOCK TOWER

This hotel restaurant is best known for its Indian buffet on Fridays — think buttery naan, rich curries, and classic desserts.

POPULAR BARS IN THIMPHU

1 DRUNKEN YETI, OPPOSITE MY MART



Famous for bold drinks like the 'Moscow Mule', 'The Yeti' (a mix of 7 spirits), and the saffron-infused 'Sildenafil' shot. Not for the faint-hearted.

2 URBAN DUMRA, LOWER CHANGZAMTOG

Bhutan's first beer garden offering creative cocktails like 'Pho Chu Mo Chu' and 'Lychee Dewa'. Known for its spacious vibe and beer festivals.

3 O' CAFÉ AND BAR, OSEL

A café by day, party spot by night. Hosts beer pong nights and serves fun cocktails like 'Si Madrid' and 'Stolen Sea Water'.

4 THE ALCHEMY PUB, CHANGLAM

A Gen Z hotspot with live music and karaoke. Known for playful drinks like the 'Syringe Shot', served inyou guessed it—a syringe.

5 RIVERSIDE GARUDA, CHANGYUL PARK

Tucked in a scenic park by the river. Best for a quiet drink like a classic 'Tom Collins' or 'Hot Toddy' after a stroll through the rose garden.

6 OLD FACTORY, CHANGLAM

Industrial-chic and buzzing with character. Try the 'White Lady' or the popular 'Denkar's Cocktail' named after a popular local travel vlogger.

7 THE GREY AREA, HOGDZIN LAM

Stylish and artsy, this bar draws the creative crowd. The cocktail list includes quirky hits like 'The English Rose', 'The Horny Fawaz', and 'Gangnam Girls'.

8 BLACK SHEEP RESTO BAR, OPPOSITE DRUK SHOPPING COMPLEX

Where tradition meets taste — one of the few spots in town serving 'Tongba', a hot millet-based brew with a rustic kick.

9 THE ROOF AT THE PEMA BY REALM, THORI LAM

A rooftop lounge with mountain views and firepits for chilly evenings. Best enjoyed with a glass of mulled wine under the stars.

POPULAR CAFÉS AND BAKERIES **IN THIMPHU**

Did you know traditional Bhutanese cuisine doesn't include dessert? For generations, meals were all about rice, spice, and cheese. But in Thimphu, things are getting sweeter. Cafés and bakeries are popping up everywhere — and here are some of our favourites.

1 TOWER CAFÉ, CLOCK TOWER SQUARE



A city staple with the best people-watching view in town. Try the Tower Burger or go classic with their big breakfast spread.

2 GAZOM DESSERTS, TABA

A minimalist café known for bakes. Get there early — the cinnamon rolls, filled doughnuts and banana bread go fast!

4 NYING BAKER'S BASEMENT

The go-to for thoughtful gift boxes. Balanced bakes like carrot cake, cream horns, and a great dark choc cake — plus salads, sandwiches, and pasta.

5 COFFEE CULTURE, CHANGLAM SQUARE

A long-time favourite for lunch or evening tea. Locals love their spicy ema datsi momos, sesame chicken and irresistible desserts.

6 BHUTANESE BOULANGERIE, TARA PHENDEYLING HOTEL

A charming pitstop en route to Paro or Punakha. Grab a Paris-style croissant or macaron with your coffee from this bakery-on-wheels.

KAY DEE CAFÉ, KAY DEE CARWASH

Yes, it's in a carwash — and yes, the desserts are worth the visit. Don't miss the banoffee pie or red velvet cupcakes.





Located 3 hours away from Thimphu, Punakha offers a different climate compared to the other Dzongkhang. Owing to its lower elevation, the winter and summer in Punakha are generally warmer. Punakha is also the main district for rice production in Bhutan.

Once upon a time, Punakha used to be the capital of Bhutan. It was the seat of government until 1955 when the administration moved to Thimphu.

Lush beautiful paddy fields and rice terraces will greet you as you enter Punakha. The pleasing landscapes and significant sites in the district make Punakha one of the most popular tourist destinations in the country.



PLACES TO VISIT IN PUNAKHA

1 PUNAKHA DZONG

The magnificent dzong is the second-oldest and second-largest dzong in the country. Punakha Dzong is one of the top attractions in Bhutan due to its beautiful architecture and significant history. The building was the seat for the Royal Government of Bhutan before the capital relocated to Tashichho Dzong in Thimphu in 1955.



2 KHAMSUM YULLEY NAMGYAL CHORTEN

Take a morning hike to Khamsum Yulley Namgyal Chorten, a picturesque chorten built by the third Queen Mother, Tshering Yangdon Wangchuck. You can reach this charming monastery with just a one hour hike through the woods and paddy fields. The chorten is an example of magnificent Bhutanese architecture. The Queen Mother built this fourstorey pagoda-style stupa to protect Bhutan and bring peace to all sentient beings and the world. It offers a spectacular view of the whole Punakha valley.






3 PUNAKHA SUSPENSION BRIDGE

If you're not afraid of heights, definitely check out the Punakha suspension bridge, the longest suspension bridge in Bhutan. It's the perfect spot for you to capture all your beautiful social media photos. The bridge measuring 160 m long is located above the broad and rapid Pho Chhu River. Traditionally, the bridge was constructed for the monks of Punakha Dzong to visit nearby villages.

4 CHIMI LHAKHANG

Chimi Lhakhang, also known as Chime Lhakhang or the Fertility Temple, is one of the highlights of a trip to Bhutan. This sacred temple is associated with the famous spiritual adept, Drukpa Kuenley, the 'Divine Madman', a term used with respect and even fondness. He is known for his bizarre and unorthodox teachings that challenged preconceived notions of society.



Chimi Lhakhang, built as a memorial to Drukpa Kuenley, is a popular pilgrimage site.

Couples from all over the world and many Bhutanese who have trouble conceiving children visit the temple to pray in the belief that Drukpa Kuenley will bless them with children.

Phuentsholing is located in southern Bhutan and is connected to the town of Jaigaon in India. It will take approximately six hours to drive 180 km from Phuentsholing to Bhutan's capital, Thimphu.

Do check the border status before embarking on your journey if you decide to travel via land.

BHUTAN VISA APPLICATION

All tourists, except for visitors from India need a visa to enter Bhutan. Indian visitors require a permit which can be acquired on arrival. There is **no quota for number of travellers to Bhutan.**

BHUTAN VISA REQUIREMENTS

- A digital copy of a valid passport with at least six months of validity.
- A recent digital passport photo.
- Arrival and departure dates.
- A one-off visa application fee of USD50.
- Sustainable Development Fee (SDF)

WHAT IS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT FEE?

The Bhutan Sustainable Development Fee (SDF) is a mandatory fee imposed on all tourists visiting Bhutan. It is intended to contribute to the country's sustainable development initiatives, including the preservation of culture and the environment, as well as **funding free education**, **healthcare**, **and infrastructure development projects**. Additionally, it helps the Kingdom manage tourism in sustainable numbers, ensuring that visitors can continue to enjoy tranquility and an intimate experience while exploring Bhutan.



- USD100 per night per adult
- USD50 for children aged 6 to 11
- SDF is waived for children aged 5 and below

Regional tourists from India are required to apply for a permit and pay INR 1,200/night.

1 Bumdra Trek



TRANSFORMING BHUTAN'S MUSEUMS INTO LIVING CULTURAL HUBS




